Psalm 135:1-7

- 1 Praise the Lord.
 - Praise the name of the Lord; praise him, you servants of the Lord,
- 2 you who minister in the house of the Lord, in the courts of the house of our God.
- **3** Praise the Lord, for the Lord is good; sing praise to his name, for that is pleasant.
- **4** For the Lord has chosen Jacob to be his own, Israel to be his treasured possession.
- **5** I know that the Lord is great, that our Lord is greater than all gods.
- 6 The Lord does whatever pleases him, in the heavens and on the earth, in the seas and all their depths.
- 7 He makes clouds rise from the ends of the earth; he sends lightning with the rain and brings out the wind from his storehouses.

John 3:1-8

1Now there was a Pharisee, a man named Nicodemus who was a member of the Jewish ruling council.

- **2** He came to Jesus at night and said, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the signs you are doing if God were not with him."
- **3** Jesus replied, "Very truly I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God unless they are born again."
- **4** "How can someone be born when they are old?" Nicodemus asked. "Surely they cannot enter a second time into their mother's womb to be born!"
- **5** Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit.
- **6** Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit.
- 7 You should not be surprised at my saying, 'You must be born again.'
- **8** The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit."

Psalm 135:1-7

John 3:1-8

If there's one conversation in the New Testament I wish I could have been privy to it's this one, the one between Jesus and Nicodemus. In a sense we are because of the transcript John provides us with. Was he there himself or did Jesus recount the gist of the conversation later? We don't always know, do we? the mechanics involved in compiling the biblical documents. But even if we weren't there ourselves, we can imagine that nighttime scene.

If you happen to have one of those formerly popular "red letter editions" of the New Testament with its intermittent black type and red type, you know Jesus is doing most of the talking here. Nicodemus is asking the questions; Jesus, providing the answers. Only Nicodemus is having a hard time understanding what Jesus is explaining to him, the topic being new birth or the birth from above. "How, Jesus, does all of this work?" he wants to know.

And we can imagine in the midst of that spirited conversation a predawn breeze gently stirring through the heights surrounding the Kidron Valley there below the old city of Jerusalem. It sighed among the fig leaves; it made the olive branches toss and turn. Perhaps the candle lighting the room where the extended conversation was being held flickered ever so slightly. Jesus, master of all things both natural and supernatural, seized upon the moment and turned what to us (and to Nicodemus) may have seemed like a small thing...turned it into a parable, a breeze bringing tidings if you will.

"The wind, Nicodemus. The wind. The wind blows all around us as if it has a will of its own; we feel it and hear it, but we do not understand where it has come from or where it will end up. Life in the Spirit is as if it were the wind of God." [The Voice Bible]

The season of Pentecost is about life in the Spirit. It's a time to be reminded that the wind of God, the Holy Spirit blows wherever God has a mind for the Spirit to blow—even in our lives! The wind blows wherever it wishes, Jesus observes.

I like how George Morrison speaks of the freedom of the wind:

"You may tell its direction, whether east or west; you may devise instruments to measure its velocity; you may watch its path across the field of corn [think wheat here], or where the giants of the forest bow before it; but spite of all minutest observation, and all the imprisoning energies of science, the breeze is still gloriously free. You can raise no barriers that will block its progress. You can forge no chains that will confine it. You cannot divert it as it crosses the ocean, or bid it halt in its hurrying for an hour."

Such is the free, unbounded movement of the Holy Spirit. You can observe it in the smallest of ways. Preachers know this full well. They hear it at the entrance to the sanctuary when Sunday worship is over. Why is it you can have such entirely different responses to the same message that was preached? Why is it heard so differently? Why do some hear in that message something you don't think you even said? Well, it's the work of the Holy Spirit blowing wherever God pleases.

It's all part of the mysterious workings of God, the not knowing where the wind comes from or where it goes.

Quoting George Morrison once more; this is what he writes about the mysterious encounters believers (even we ourselves) have had with God:

"As with the wind, we can trace back the course of [our] spiritual renewal. Perhaps we can point to a sermon or a payer, or a quiet talk with somebody we trusted; perhaps we can point to a striking and signal providence, or to a terrible illness when we fought

with death, or to an pen grave when the dull earth that thudded seemed to be falling on the heart. So is everyone that is born of the Spirit. We can trace out the history a little way. We can say it was this or that which changed us to the depths, in the unerring providence of God. But when we have said all that, and said it gratefully, then overpowers us the wonder of it all, and saved by grace when we deserved the darkness, we can but whisper, 'We know not whence it cometh.'"

But the effects, Jesus says, the effects of the wind we definitely can observe. We can hear the sound of the wind and we can see what it does when it blows. In our lives, too. Others should be able to see that as well. The presence of the Holy Spirit's presence in a Christian's life has consequences and should have a certain measurable effect. The listing of the fruit of the Spirit in Galatians 6 gives us a checklist to measure ourselves against. Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control become increasingly evident in our lives. These are the signs of the Spirit's presence in our lives, the Spirit, remember, of Jesus.

One thing more about the wind that Jesus points out. He reminds Nicodemus of the wind's ultimate destination, the fact that we really don't know where it goes or where it'll end up. I find that exciting when we apply that analogy to our life in the Spirit, that we don't know what power, and use, and blessing we'll travel on to as we go through life as followers of Jesus, living in his Spirit and his Spirit living in us!

The details, of course, we can't tell peering into the future; but we can be sure it'll involve joy, and victory, and power, and usefulness, and gratitude. Best of all, it'll all lead to Him! The Spirit will make sure of it.

We pray for the safety of those who must travel by land, sea, and air, for those who long to travel but cannot, and for all those who are separated from those they love.

We pray for the sick, the suffering, and the isolated, for victims of violence, refugees and captives, and for our protection against all affliction, danger, and distress.
